
Our Volunteers are Pawsome!



From Leader Dog Employee to Volunteer

After twelve years as an employee in Leader Dog's philanthropy department, Mike retired. Soon after, he realized just how much he missed being on the Leader Dog campus. So, what did he do? Sign up to volunteer, of course!

"I believe that our clients are the most courageous people I have ever met," Mike says. "I cannot imagine crossing a busy street relying on a cane or a dog and my instincts."

Mike, an active Lions Club Member, now serves in our client services department fielding phone calls from prospective and current clients. He helps with frequently asked questions, applications and other logistic questions or concerns.

Every Friday presents itself with another set of life-changing stories or moments with clients Mike feels privileged to talk to. "While I would like to blame my watery eyes on the fluorescent lights in our department, I know it's the conversations I have with the amazing people we serve. The most frequent comment I get from new clients is, 'I wish I would have come to Leader Dog sooner.'"

"I have always maintained that when I grew up, I wanted to be part of client services," says Mike. "I'm not sure I have grown up, but I have achieved that goal. This is the most rewarding thing I have ever done."

He continues: "There is a common thread that runs through everyone who volunteers or donates to Leader Dog. It is an undeniable passion to empower people who are blind or visually impaired to travel safely and independently. If you share this passion, I encourage you to volunteer, donate or, better yet, do both."

Breeding Host and Puppy Raiser: Shannon





Shannon is a breeding host and puppy raiser, and she recently began training as a human guide volunteer. So far, she and her daughter have raised 19 puppies total.

"The Leader Dog organization has always been on my mind since I was a child because my dad had a friend whose son was blind," Shannon says. "I remember him donating to Leader Dog. Also, our daughter is a type 1 diabetic, and we understand how many different health conditions can impact vision."

Shannon's favorite part of the Leader Dog mission is the people she meets and the stories they tell. "From the raiser who has raised 20 dogs, to the people you randomly talk to when you are out in public working with a puppy, to the trainers and their intense energy, to other breeding hosts and their experiences, to the retired veterinarian who volunteers on campus and to the clients who are matched with a dog."

Shannon has a message for people who tell her they could never raise a puppy and then give the dog up: "The most difficult things in life are the most rewarding and meaningful, and allow for the most growth as a human being. You will get to meet incredible people, whether it's staff at Leader Dog, raisers, breeding hosts or people who donate and support Leader Dog. And, you will have a connection to something very special."

Legacy Giving with Carolyn

Carolyn was inspired to begin puppy raising in 1994, marking the start of an incredible commitment of service to others.

Since then, Carolyn has raised 36 puppies for Leader Dog. "My most endearing moments are when I



get to meet the clients that receive one of the puppies that I have raised," Carolyn says. "This helps me to witness the direct impact I have on this program and to stay motivated to continue."

Carolyn has built a legacy of service, leaving a permanent mark on both the puppies she's raised and the individuals whose lives she's touched. To ensure that this important work continues for years to come, Carolyn has chosen to leave a gift in her estate plan to support Leader Dogs for the Blind.

"Since I can't raise puppies forever, I decided to include Leader Dog In my estate plan because I wanted to make sure that the Leader Dog mission would continue for generations to come," said Carolyn.
